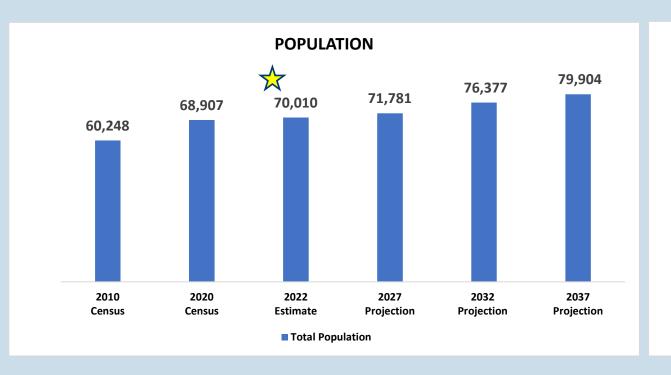
What the Draft Master Plan is NOT?

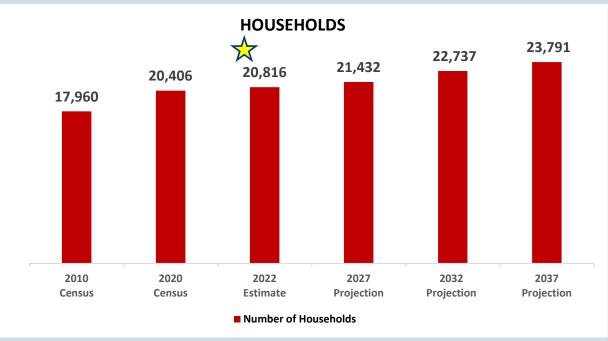
Recommendations are NOT intended to be "IN STONE"

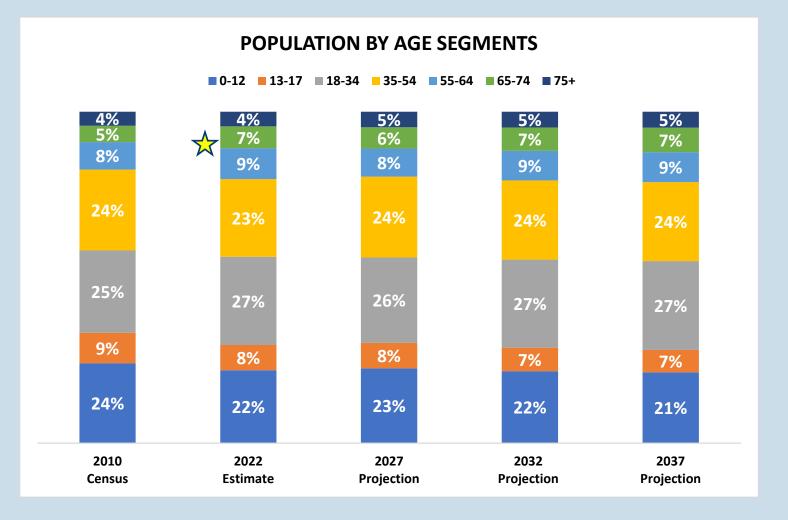

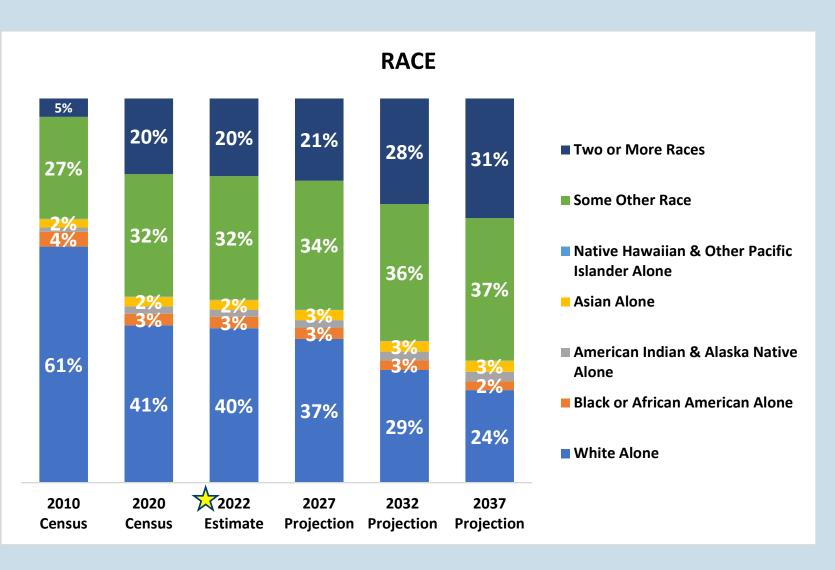




TULARE 55+ POPULATION PERCENTAGE = 20%

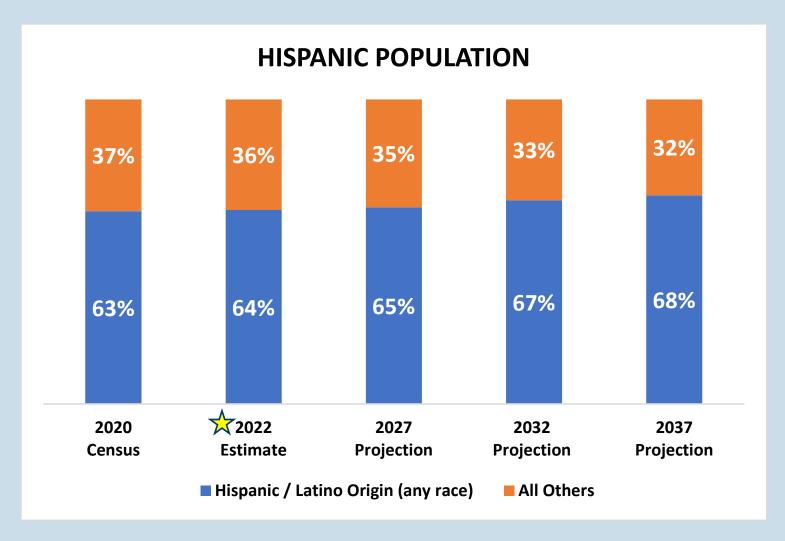




TULARE WHITE ALONE POPULATION % = 40%

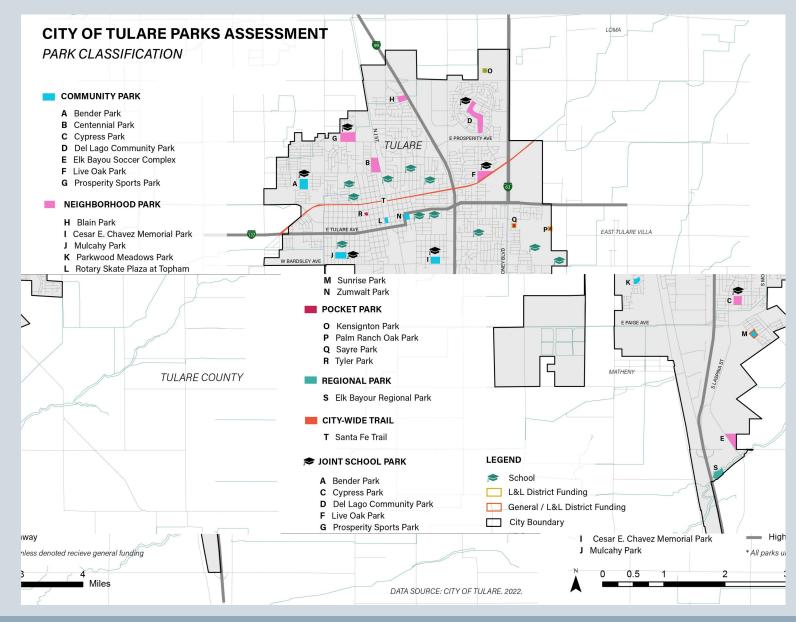

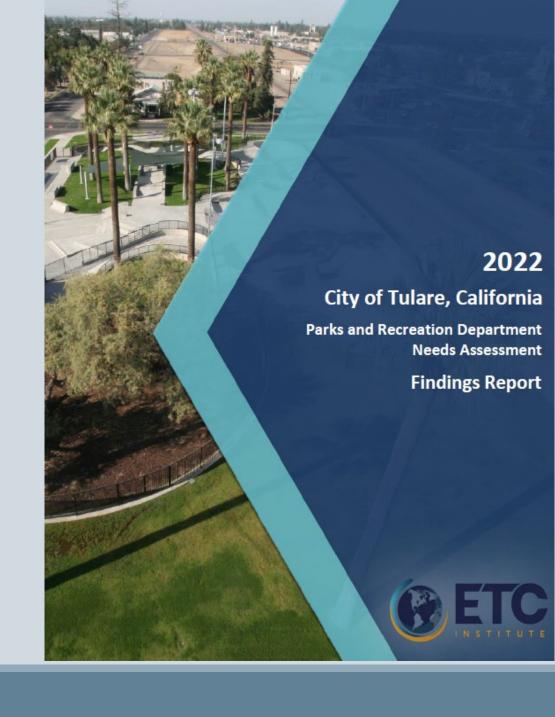

Statistically-Valid Survey

- Developed in partnership with the City
- Administered by mail/phone/web
- Administered in English and Spanish
- 8% of adults in Tulare speak only Spanish. 18% of surveys returned were completed in Spanish.
- Methodology allows high return rate (25%-35%)
- Total of **317** completed surveys, 95% level of confidence with a margin of error of +/- 5.5% (Goal was 300)

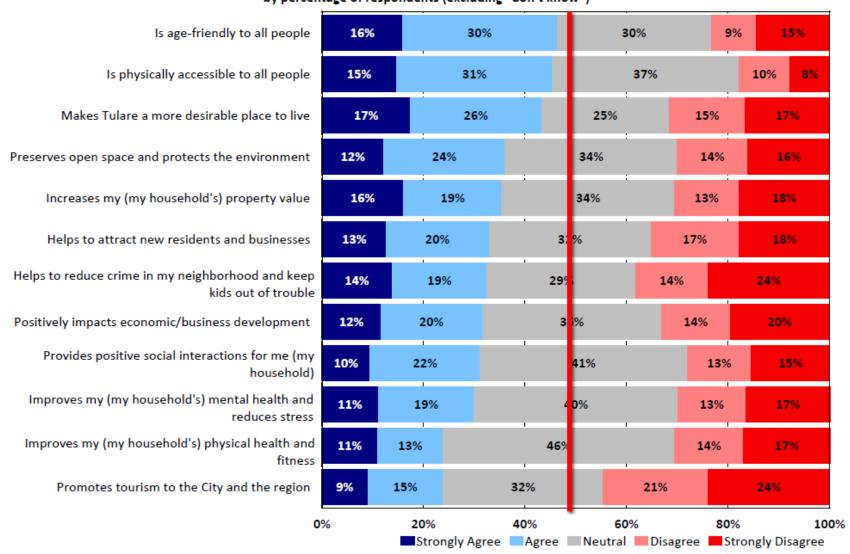

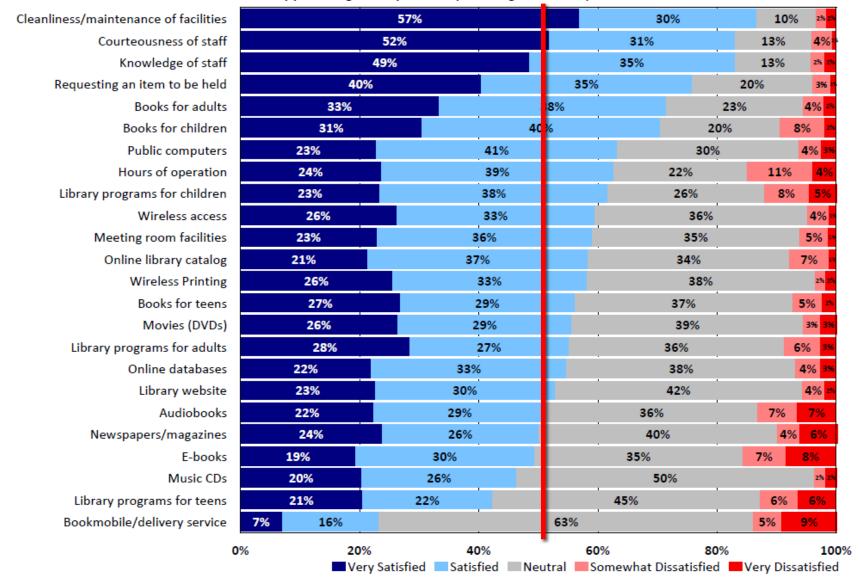
Q14. Level of Agreement With Statements About Tulare Community Services Department

Q13. Rating Library Services

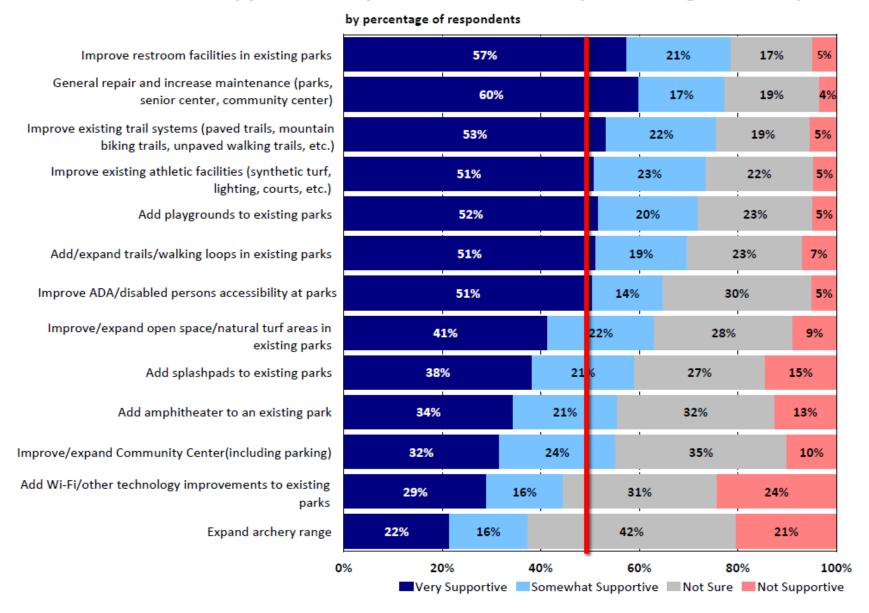
by percentage of respondents (excluding "don't use")



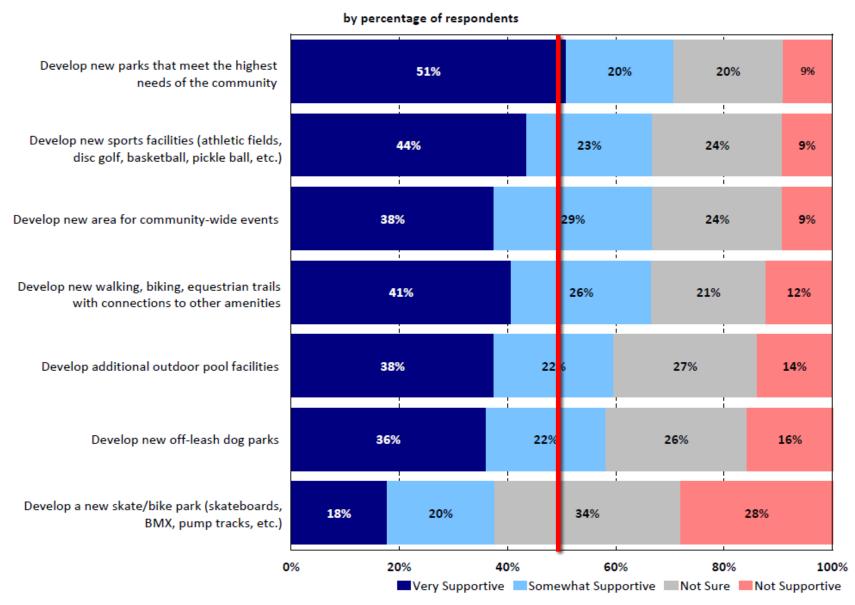

Q15. Level of Support for Improvement Actions (to Existing Facilities)



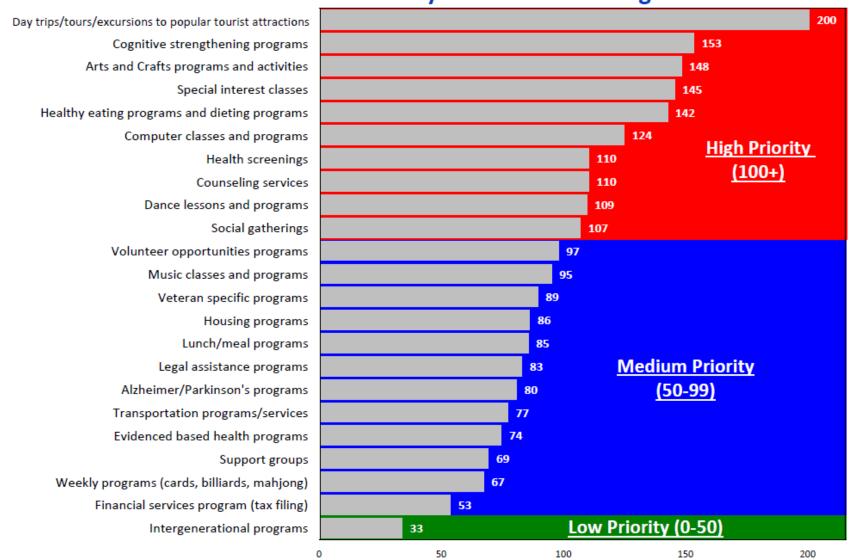
Q15. Level of Support for Improvement Actions (Developing New Facilities)



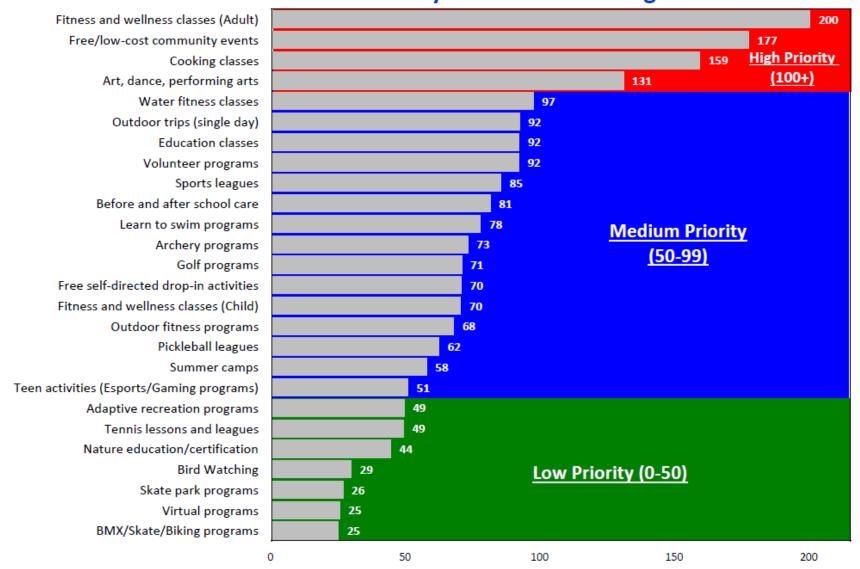

Top Priorities for Investment for Active Aging Program/Service Based on the Priority Investment Rating

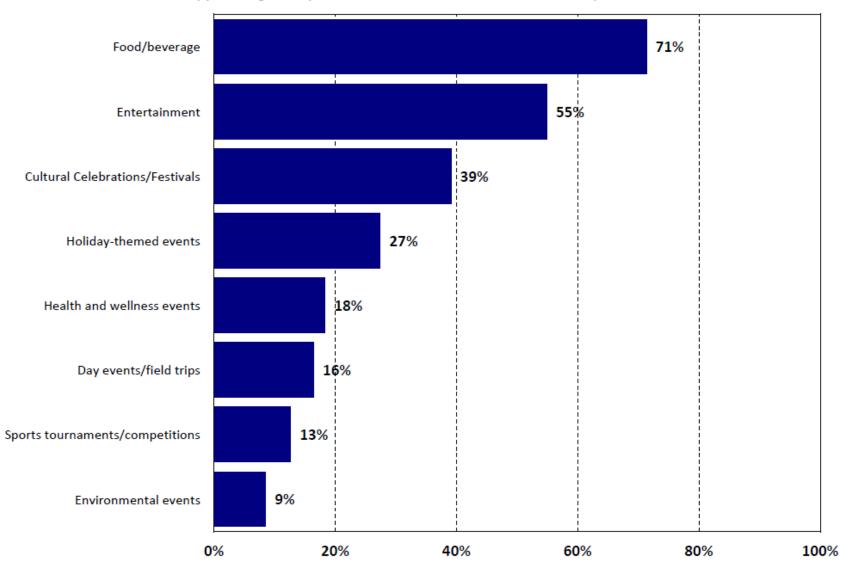


Top Priorities for Investment for Recreation Programs Based on the Priority Investment Rating

by percentage of respondents who chose the event as one of their top 3 choices

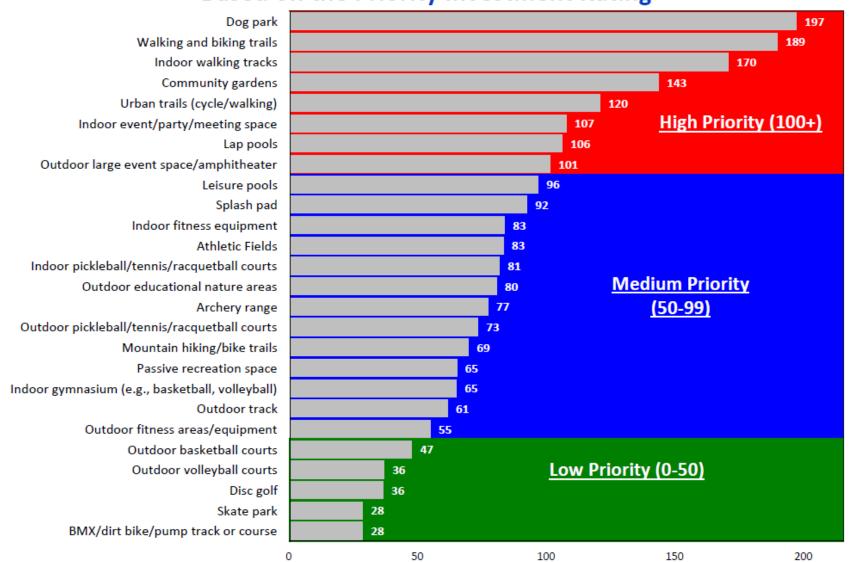

Level of Service Methodology

- * Level of Service standards guide the investment in new parks, facilities and amenities.
- Developed using a combination of local, regional and national resources, including:
- Prioritization of Community Need
- Current Level of Service Is current level of service appropriate?
- Population Growth What is the anticipated population growth in next 15 years
- Current Inventory and its condition ratings Is there a greater need to take care of what already exists vs. construct new?
- Opportunity to acquire and develop parkland
- National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) guidelines.
- Recreation participation rates reported by the Sports & Fitness Industry Association's (SFIA) 2022 Study of Sports.
- Market Potential Indices
- Financial Sustainability Operations and maintenance funding needed to support new investment

Level of Service Methodology

<u>Population based</u> standards are *not* developed for:

- Natural Area Park Acreage
- Trail Miles

Natural Area Park acquisition is based on resource location and opportunity to acquire this typology of park land rather than city population

<u>Trail Miles</u> is based on developing a connected network rather than city population

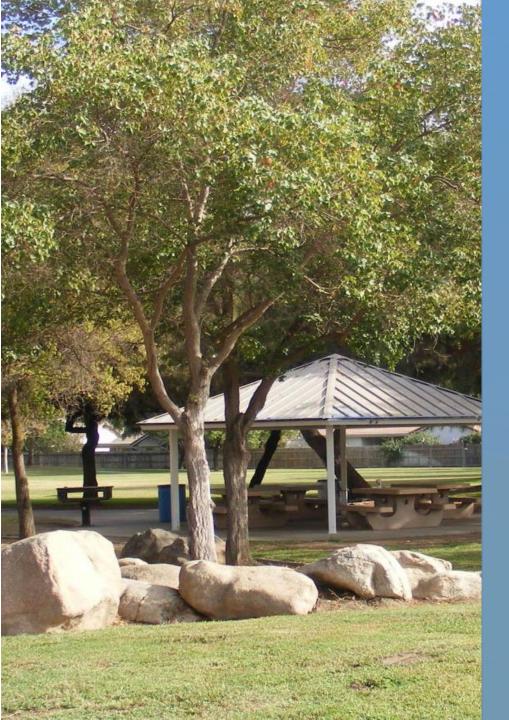

Focus Areas

 <u>Level of Service Provision</u> - Maintain the proportion of park acres per population

Trails - Establish connectivity between parks and greenways

 Park Land Improvements - Provide a park and recreation system offering the community a variety of parks and services

Focus Areas

 Recreation Programming - Increase community participation in programs to 40% to align with national standards.

 Operations and Staffing - Empower and train current department employees while growing staff as the parks and recreation system expands.

 Financing the Park System – Pursue adequate funding to support improvements to existing system and operations & maintenance
